Course Outline: International Contract Law

Description and Learning Objectives

The course is an introduction to the legal aspects of transacting business across national borders in a world divided into sovereign states. It compares the ways European civil law and Anglo-American common law handle public enforcement of private bargains. The course examines in some detail the International Convention on the Sale of Goods ("CISG"), a transnational contract law that has now has been adopted by 84 countries.

Goals: to give students increased awareness of the legal infrastructure that supports (and sometimes hinders) the flow of goods, services and intangibles between and among nations, and to enhance communication between those engaged in business and their legal advisers.

Grading: will be based on attendance, participation in class discussion, case analysis assignments and a final exam or written paper.
